### Standing Your Ground

Emma Harris teaches Natural History at Kensington Grade School. One Tuesday morning she asked the third grade class, “Where is the elephant found? She waited for the answer, but there was only silence. So, she asked again, “Can anyone tell me where the elephant is found?” More silence. So she asked, “Stephanie, can you tell me?”. No response. Finally, Stephanie answered, “Well, to tell the truth, the elephant is such a big animal, I don’t think it’s ever lost.”

We can be so smart and educated, so self-sufficient or self-reliant that we are hardly ever lost. We have our lives under control and we can stand on our own two feet. As parents we teach our children and even our grandchildren to “stand on their own two feet”. But, rarely are they taught what ground to stand on.

So, when your world comes crashing down around you and you are lost, you simply smile and act as if everything is under control. When someone asks how you are, you answer, “Fine! Everything is fine!”.

What you may not realize is the “fine” is an acronym for:

F—frustrated  
I—irritated  
N—nervous  
E—exhausted

Yes, you’re “fine”. Everything is “fine”.

I wondered how the disciples felt as they followed Jesus. “We’ve been chosen by the one sent from God; the one who is God, to be His disciples. Everything is great. We’ve seen His healings and miracles. We’ve heard Him speak such wonderful words. Can you imagine that He asked us to follow Him and have connections to such power?”.

But then, come the storm on the lake and a sinking boat. There was no Jesus, no God present. Panic and fear took over as they bailed out their boat. Then Jesus came to them walking on the water, and after rescuing Peter from drowning, they (Peter and Jesus) got into the boat. That’s when the storm calmed down.

Is that the main point of the story as Matthew tells it? That, when you have Jesus in your boat, or your life, and your home, the sudden unexpected storms are not so overwhelming.

So, if Emma Harris’ question to Stephanie had been, “Where is Jesus found?”, her answer might have been, “He’s not lost. He’s in my boat. He’s in my daily life.”

Now! That’s solid ground to stand on!




